

Legislative Agenda Update

February 18, 2020

Guidance from the New Haven Delegation



Members of the New Haven delegation recommended the following key tenets for potential legislative change in the current session:

- State is projecting a \$60 million deficit; unlikely educational grant programs will increase beyond current projected levels.
- Short legislative session will greatly limit ability to introduce new legislation.
- Target incremental changes that would benefit both New Haven and other communities, to increase likelihood of support from other delegations.

What Were We Seeking?



Attempt to drive a change in the state statute governing the Alliance Grant – C.G.S. 10-262u(d) – to:

- Put numeracy on an equal footing with literacy, enabling New Haven to use the grant to purchase the new Mathematics curriculum.
- Deploy new/upgraded technology to classrooms.
- Explore new methods of early childhood education, including learning through play.

Appropriations Committee, February 13, 2020



- State Department of Education and Office of Early Childhood testify before the Appropriations Committee on the morning of February 13, 2020.
- NHPS CFO and lobbyist prepare written testimony for the Committee advocating for additional permitted spending of the Alliance Grant.
- Following the hearing, brief conversation with the Commissioner of Education.

Appropriations Committee, continued



- More lengthy conversations with members of the New Haven delegation (Walker, Candelaria, Porter) regarding the grant, as well as Appropriations Committee members from Bridgeport and Willimantic.
- Conversations were positive and supportive; also received assurances that the primary grant supporting EL would not be cut.
- Lobbyist for the City of New Haven and New Haven Advocates testify during the public hearing portion of the day.

Additional Developments after the Hearing



- Originally began drafting language to alter the Alliance Grant portion of the state statutes.
- Subsequent conversations with City of New Haven and BOE lobbyists indicate more flexibility in the grant than the statute would suggest.
- Commissioner of Education specifically cites work of Meriden and Vernon in utilizing the grant.
- Grant uses targeting Talent, Academics, Climate and Operations (TACO) are likely to be approved by the Commissioner.
- Reconfirmed that the grant cannot be used to supplant General Fund expenditures.

Next Steps



- Will work with School Improvement Office to determine what 2020-21 proposed expenditures can be covered by the grant.
- Proposed additional EL supports and Health teachers can definitely be covered by the grant.
- Will work with Meriden and Vernon to see how their grant applications are structured.
- Revise 2020-21 'new spending' request as appropriate for February 19 Special Meeting of the BOE.
- Testify before Education Committee hearing (tentatively scheduled for Friday, February 21).
